July 28-30, 2022

Director and Regional Chair Chris Gray called the meeting to order July 28, 12:30

The Agenda was approved, per Attachment 1.

The attendees list as per Attachment 2, with the following exceptions:

1. RVC Student Activities was present at the July 30 meeting only
2. Baton Rouge Delegate/Alternate, Birmingham Alternate, Mississippi Alternate Tennessee Valley Alternate were not present at the July 30 meeting
3. Bluegrass Chapter Alternate served as Delegate; Mr. William Perkins served as Alternate
4. Northwest Florida Delegate was Mr. Benjamin Womble

o Dunstan Macauley, Society VP noted that ASHRAE has lack of commercialization; it's a society of volunteers. A diversity, equity & inclusion initiative is in its second year in existence. Task force for building decarbonization-adding a Distinguished Lecturer. On line Board meetings are now available for all members. Multi member employer benefits are being discussed, particularly a 10% discount plus one complimentary registration to annual and winter meetings.

The Board of Directors is discussing a new Composition & Leadership Structure; the current structure is based on 1959 consolidation, with a N. America focus. Is there a better framework? Three major Councils exist today – PubEd, Technology, Members. 4 options – A)keep Board as is, B)as is with changes to planning and Finance, C) reorganize chapters and D) a different regional structure & create Districts. Preferred option is Six Districts with Existing Regions (with existing structure), keeping the three Councils as today.

Concept of Districts: Chapters are functioning well so leave as is. RVC roles would stay the same. The DRC would be on Members Council and Board would have District members and 6 Society at large District Directors. New Board would have 12 members.

This major organizational change was presented to the Board at Annual Conference and will be discussed at Fall Board conference.

o Regional Budget Report - Ballard

♣ Recap of 2022-2023 Budget – presented actual expenditures year to date and last year’s budget. Noted Budget’s commence on July 1. Approvals lag by one month. Have scaled back Chapter assessments to whittle down the outstanding balance. Chapter Opportunity Fund was discussed and few Chapters have asked for these special one-time funds, but funds are available.

♣ Proposed 2023-2024 Budget – Mr. Ballard reviewed the proposed budget lines and then made the **motion** to approve. Seconded by James Bond (North Alabama. Motion passed unanimously

o Chapter Reports – these are not included here but are available if requested. Of note were comments related to virtual versus in person meetings. Baton Rouge, Birmingham, Bluegrass, East Tennessee, Louisville, Mississippi, Mobile, Nashville, Tennessee Valley and West Virginia all noted concerns and/or decreased attendance with virtual meetings versus in-person.

♣ Nashville is moving to Star Chapter website management -first in Region VII. About 40 US Chapters are using it.

♣ Memphis had one person responsible for PAOE points and solicited at every BOG meeting

♣ Northwest Florida continues to have difficulties. The DRC is working with them to strengthen the Chapter. The general consensus was to continue as a Chapter (44 years old) and not move to a Section.

♣ Tennessee Valley noted they have invited code enforcement people to attend.

Background:

The Chuck Koptis Award has historically been awarded, but has not been awarded in recent years because it has not been officially memorialized in our Regional MOP.

Suggested MOP rider additions are as follows:

The Region VII Chuck Koptis Memorial RP award is to be awarded to the chapter with the highest achievement in RP over their assigned goal as a % of goal. It is to be awarded as a plaque to the RP Chair of the winning chapter.

Chuck Koptis was a long-time dedicated Region VII Leader. He was instrumental in maintaining the North Alabama Chapter and was North Alabama's President for the 1993-1994 Society year. Chuck was also a Region VII DRC for the 1987-1990 Society years and even added a chapter called the Tombigbee chapter during his term. Chuck was made an ASHRAE Fellow in 1994.

Fiscal Impact: approximately \$100 per year for a creation and shipping of a plaque.

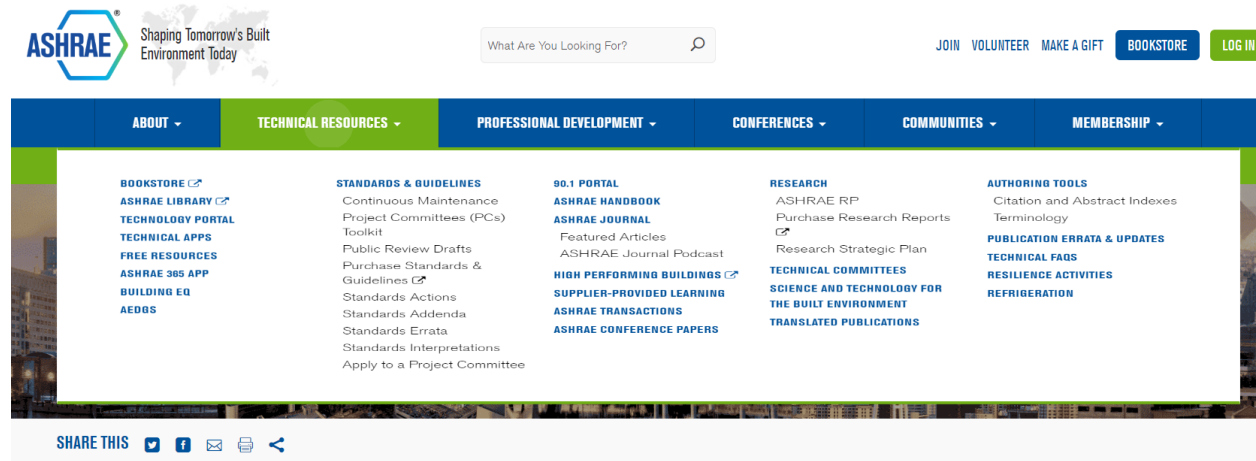

Background:

ASHRAE currently facilitates two “Task Forces”: the Epidemic Task Force and the Task Force for Building Decarbonization. When discussing these initiatives with people outside of ASHRAE, the complicated naming adds confusion.

Additionally, neither Task Force is directly linked on the ashrae.com website menu. Both Task Forces have unique URLs and are linked further down the home page, but are not included in the Technical Resources tab. One has to find the links on the main page or know the direct URL to get to the information.

Motion: For the membership benefit to change from the handbook PDF to handbook online.

Background:

The handbook PDFs are not well suited as an online/electronic version any longer. It lacks usability that most people expect “now a days” from an online document. It was a good for the initial transition from a printed version to an online version. Transitioning to the handbook online version as a benefit allows Society to disrupt access of this benefit more easily if the Member does not pay. This also facilitates the future adoption of payment plans and/or “ASHARE as a service” (like software as a service).

This should also help protect the copyrighted nature of the handbook. You are no longer putting 50,000 PDF versions of ASHRAE’s most prized offering into the marketplace each year.

The handbook PDFs would become available for purchase similarly to the Standards. Each handbook is on a 4-year update cycle and each new version would become available for purchase. It is not an “evergreen” purchase of a handbook, just that specific version/year.

The handbook online revenue would disappear, but the sale(s) of the PDF would increase. The equilibrium point is unpredictable between these revenue streams.

While some International Members wish for the return of the traditional printed Handbook, a large section of the membership has embraced the Handbooks as an online resource. ASHRAE Membership used to have a valuable benefit in the printed Handbook, now it gets a second-class version of the online document.

Fiscal Impact:

The costs...

- Costs associated with programming the websites.
- The tradeoff of online version revenue versus PDF version revenue.
- Potential opportunity to sell past versions of the handbooks

Robust discussion on both sides of the issue.

Motion: That (Conferences and Expositions) include a hotel option that has significantly lower per night cost for winter and annual conferences than the Headquarters hotel

Background: Many members would likely be interested in coming to the winter and annual conferences but the room cost per night is not within their budget. More companies are not supporting their employees financially, so they have no option to attend. A lower cost option that might be several miles away from the headquarters hotel would be an enticement for additional participation and should not impact the room block at the headquarters hotel. Bringing ASHRAE's bargaining clout for a room block in a less expensive hotel would open meeting attendance to those that cannot afford to stay at a hotel that can run \$300 per night.

Fiscal Impact: Negligible fiscal impact, Staff time to locate and negotiate additional hotel.

Likely a net positive fiscal impact as it would likely increase the number conference registrations, bookstore sales, and possibly increase member retention.

Motion: Use of a portion of the Opportunity Fund to support chapter members attendance at the 2023 Winter Conference in Atlanta, GA.

Background: This is a regional motion to request distributions from the Region VII Opportunity Fund to encourage participation of more Region VII members to attend the ASHRAE Winter Conference 2023. Moreover, this fiscal support from Region VII would provide professional development and networking opportunities for the chosen chapter members. Note: The DRC to will apply the same criteria for selection as is used for the LeaDRS program.

Fiscal Impact: \$885 per approved Chapter Member for the conference registration fee. Transportation cost to be capped at \$400 for round trip airfare and/or mileage at the current IRS mileage rate for the 2023 fiscal year - \$1,285 for the maximum reimbursement. Note: The hotel or rental of accommodations are to be covered by the chapter or by the individual conference attendee.

Background: ASHRAE award recipients exemplify the best in engineering, technology, and ASHRAE participation by continually bringing credit to the profession and the Society. Chapter H&A Chairs are not emphasized as a critical chair and not always filled. With an H&A RVC position, that person would ensure that Chapter Chairs would be filled and provide leadership as other RVC's currently do to recognize the dedicated ASHRAE Members who give freely of their time and expertise to fulfill the Society's mission. Being recognized by one's peers is a sign of real success.

Fiscal Impact: Utilize existing staff for development and implementation. Society travel reimbursement for their CRC participation. Would not require membership in Society H&A Committee (similar to Regional Historian). Fiscal impact would be \$7,000-\$10,000 per year

Any re-organization of the ASHRAE Board of Directors should in no way lessen the direct representation of any Region at the Board of Directors' level. The attempt to make the ASHRAE Board of Directors more strategically capable in its duties by reducing the number of the voting members doesn't necessarily achieve this goal at the expense of the grassroots membership of ASHRAE.

Motion: It shall be required for the proposed ASHRAE reorganization plan, specifically referred to as “Option D” (referenced as “Attachment F” in the June 29th, 2022 BOD meeting minutes), to be presented to each CRC for input and discussion so that information regarding the proposed changes can be distributed to chapter memberships prior to being put to a society board vote and/or sent to membership for a by-laws vote.

Background: As part of a streamlining initiative, a committee was formed to evaluate potential options to reorganize the structure of the organization, including the board of directors. One of the options outlined by the committee involves the creation of numerous districts in which 2-4 regions would be aligned per district. The resulting effect is that DRCs would no longer serve on the ASHRAE society BOD and would instead be a part of members council whereas district directors/representatives would be on the society board. It is unclear whether the appointed committee recommended Option D or what recommendation (if any) the committee made by vote or consensus. There is a potential concern that the creation of districts adds another layer between chapters and society and how specifically districts vs regions will inherently make the board more strategic vs its current state and how much input chapters will have in selection of district representatives. Moreover, the current timeline proposed in BOD meeting minutes makes it possible that the board advances the reorganization motion during their Oct 2022 meeting, the by-laws change/membership vote is announced at the 2023 Winter conference (Feb 2023), and a membership vote occurs before three spring CRCs occur (April/May 2023) and have opportunity to provide input/feedback.

Fiscal Impact: \$0 – Consistent with normal leadership visits to CRCs and CRC procedures.

Background: Many government agencies do not allow their employees to be reimbursed or to directly pay for professional society memberships. However, the government agencies will make provisions for their employees to receive training and continuing education. The ASHRAE conferences provide numerous professional development hour opportunities.

We are looking to establish a new Special Membership Program that would allow a government employee to receive an ASHRAE membership for one year with the purchase of a full registration to the Winter or Summer ASHRAE Conferences. This program could possibly increase attendance to the conferences and conference revenue. The ultimate goal of the program would be to increase the participation of our local government officials in our chapter meetings and events.

Fiscal Impact: Negligible. Potential to increase net revenue for the Society.

Fiscal Impact: Very little fiscal impact, if any, since this information should already be available at the Society level and passed down to the chapters.
